Karakamia Sanctuary

Feel the magic of coming face to face with endangered animals in the wild at Karakamia Wildlife Sanctuary, only an hour out of Perth in the hills near Chidlow.

Enjoy wandering through Jarrah and Marri forests at dusk observing both common and threatened native animals, like the Woylie, Brushtail Possum, Quenda and Tammar Wallaby.

Join a twilight spotlight walk with commentary from an expert guide and see what these South Western forests would have been like 200 years ago.

Visit Karakamia

Located approximately 50km east of Perth, Karakamia Sanctuary offers guided twilight walking tours on Friday and Saturday nights throughout the year. Start times vary depending on sunset (from 5:00pm mid winter to 7:00pm mid summer).

Bookings are essential.

The 3km guided spotlight walk follows bush-tracks and takes about two hours to complete. Our expert guides stop along the way to talk about the habitats and the animals you observe.

We provide: The guide, spotlights and a hot drink at the visitor centre afterwards.

You need to bring: Comfortable covered walking shoes, warm clothes in winter and insect repellent in summer. A small torch, binoculars and camera are optional.

About AWC

The mission of Australian Wildlife Conservancy (AWC) is the effective conservation of all Australian animal species and the habitats in which they live.

To achieve our mission, AWC establishes and manages wildlife sanctuaries in areas of high conservation value around Australia. A distinguishing feature of the way in which AWC operates is our commitment to active land management of our sanctuaries, informed by the best available science.

Establishing wildlife sanctuaries

AWC acquires land, and works with other landholders, to protect threatened wildlife and habitats.

AWC now manages 21 sanctuaries covering more than 2.5 million hectares across Australia.

On-ground conservation programs

More than 80% of AWC's staff are based in the field where they implement practical conservation programs including feral animal control, weed eradication, fire management and threatened species translocations.

Conducting scientific research

AWC works in collaboration with universities, museums, CSIRO and a range of other organisations to conduct research on key issues affecting biodiversity.

4

Public education

AWC hosts visitor programs at our sanctuaries to promote the plight of Australia's threatened wildlife. We have dedicated school visits and public education programs at several of our sanctuaries, supported by walking trails, interpretive centres and campground facilities.

5

Measuring results

We measure the impact of land management through the implementation of an innovative biodiversity monitoring program. This way, we can demonstrate our land management is delivering results.
